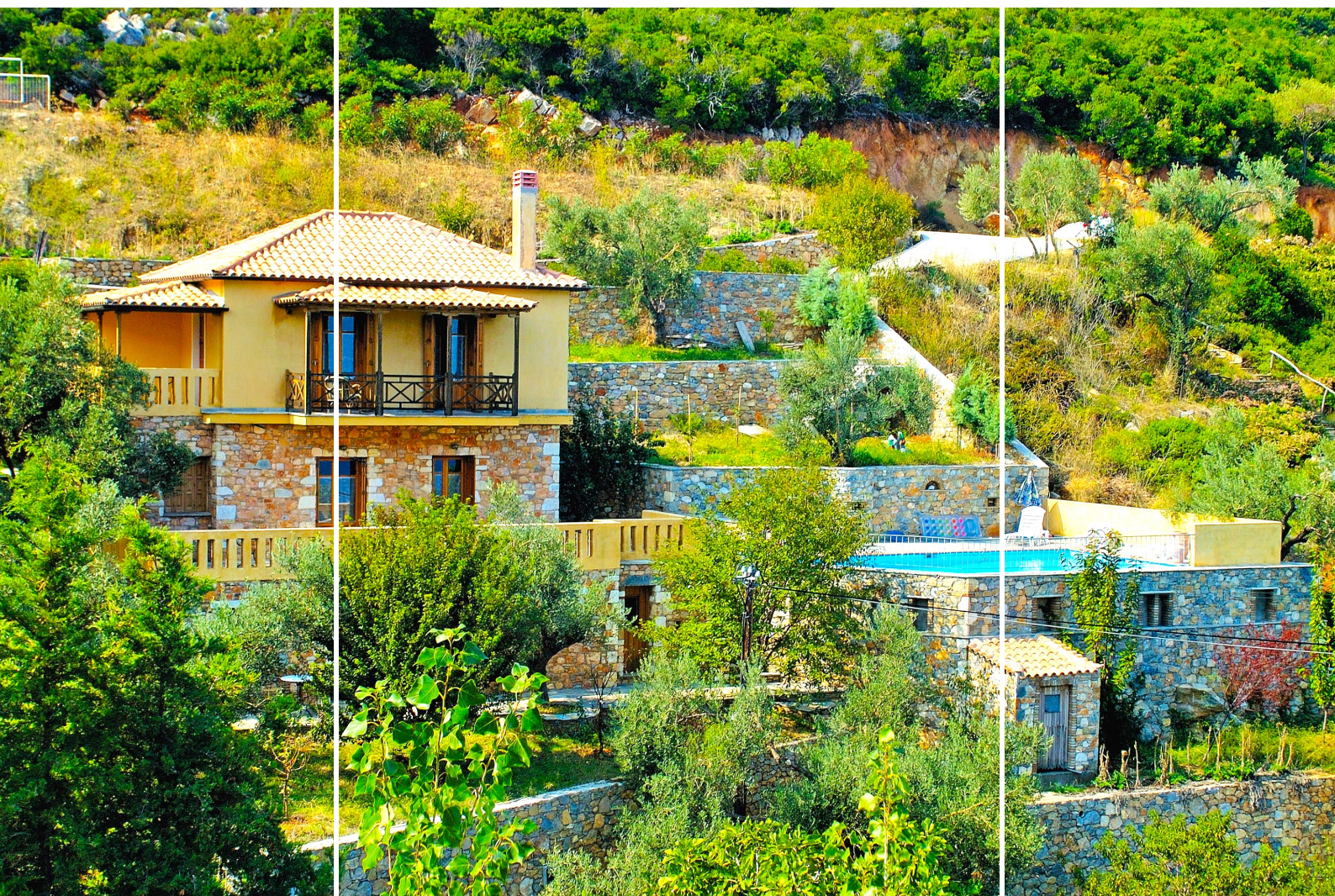

ABOUT VILLA PERISTERA

CLEANING

The property is cleaned every three days. The cleaner disposes of the rubbish as well.

HOT WATER

The water is heated by the use of solar power. Hot water should be available at all times. If otherwise, please contact your Representative.

AIR CONDITIONING

The air conditioning is operated by a remote control. The usual temperature is around 22°C. All doors and windows should be closed for air conditioning to function properly.

KEYS

The keys to your property can be found in the front door and instructions on where to leave them will be given in your departure letter. We would ask that you take good care of the keys to the property as if they are your own. In the unlikely event you were to lose the keys, please contact your Representative and you will be provided with a spare set.

However, should it be necessary to change the locks for security reasons as a result of lost keys, we reserve the right to make a charge for which you may be liable for. We would ask that you also be mindful when you are outside the villa and around the pool area not to lock yourselves out. This can happen easily as the wind can slam doors very quickly.



Should you get locked out contact your Representative.

Please note that these extra keys are for use only in emergency - we cannot provide spare keys as a matter of course.

WATER

The property's tap water is not drinkable. We advise you to consume bottled water.

SWIMMING POOL

The pool is cleaned three times a week.

CCTV

The outside areas of the property are monitored by a CCTV.

SAFETY DEPOSIT BOX

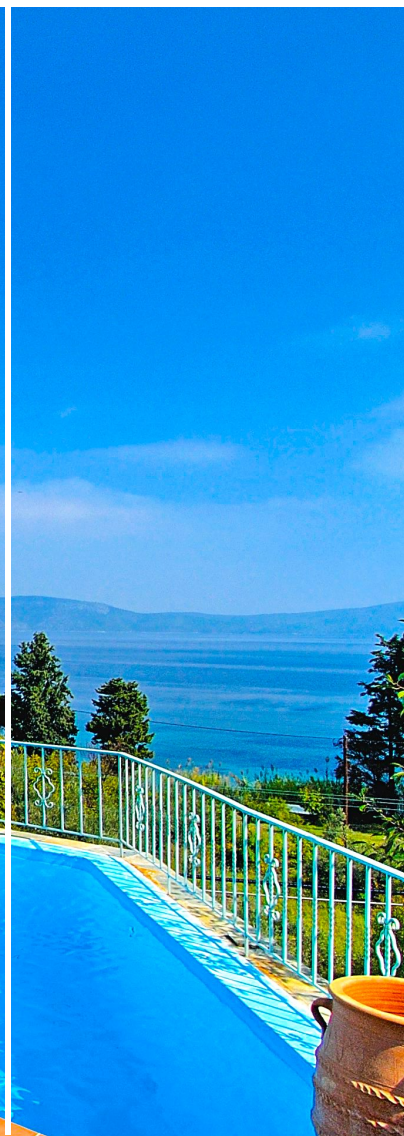
The safe is located in the closet and is operated by a key.

INTERNET

Wifi connection is free of charge. Details of passwords are given in your welcome letter.

LOST PROPERTY

Please ensure all personal possessions are packed when leaving your accommodation. Whilst we will endeavour to assist when items are left, unfortunately we are unable to guarantee the return of any items which have been left unattended and will not be liable for any items lost or damaged. If we are able to locate your lost item, postage, packaging and handling fees may apply for the return of the lost items.



HEALTH & SAFETY

To help ensure that your holiday will be both happy and safe, we would kindly ask that you take the time to read the following information.

Part of the enjoyment of traveling abroad is experiencing a different way of life. Please remember though, that it may also mean experiencing different standards from those we are used to at home. We are continually working to raise safety standards in all of our properties and will of course do our best to ensure that your holiday is safe and trouble-free, but we do ask that you take extra care while you are away. With this in mind, we would like to highlight the following important points.

FIRE SAFETY

Other countries have different fire safety regulations and procedures. Please read carefully all safety information available in your property and in this information book. When you first arrive, please make sure you familiarise yourself with the location of the fire exits and the location of all fire extinguishers.

To help avoid the risk of fire, please take particular care when cooking and using the barbecue.

IN THE UNLIKELY EVENT OF A FIRE:

- RAISE THE ALARM
- CALL THE FIRE BRIGADE - 199
- DO NOT PANIC

Leave the building. Do not stop to take personal belongings with you

- IF THE EXITS/STAIRS ARE BLOCKED keep the doors shut and try to get out onto a balcony for fresh air and to attract attention
- DO NOT RE-ENTER THE BUILDING - AWAIT FOR CLEARANCE FROM THE FIRE BRIGADE

BATHROOMS

In common with many Mediterranean countries, your bathroom will probably have a marble or tiled floor. Shower curtains are not always provided and most bathrooms do not have non-slip mats in either the bath or shower, so extra care must be taken when the floor is wet, particularly with children.

Due to the size of the standard bore sewerage pipe used, Greek toilets cannot properly dispose of any paper or other waste material. To avoid blockages, please ensure that all paper, nappies and sanitary items are placed in the bin provided, which will be emptied regularly.

GLASS PANELS/DOORS

Although most properties have safety stickers on glass doors this may not always be the case, so particular care should be taken when walking through glass patio doors, as it can be difficult to tell if they are open or closed.

SECURITY AND VALUABLES

Where available, it is generally advisable to use the safety deposit facilities, or hotel safe, at your property, particularly for valuables.

WATER

Although tap water is purified it can cause upset stomachs and so it is best to drink bottled water, which may be purchased in local shops. To avoid dehydration and the effects of the sun it is advisable to drink water, in addition to other drinks you may consume.

PLUMBING

Drainage systems in Greece are not always efficient as small bore pipes are often used. A blockage will cause considerable inconvenience and during the summer season plumbers can be hard to find. To avoid problems of this nature, please do not put any products other than a small amount of toilet paper into the toilet. A bin is provided in the bathroom for disposable nappies and other sanitary products.

RUBBISH DISPOSAL

The maid will dispose of your rubbish on visits to the property. If you wish to dispose of rubbish in between visits, your Representative will advise you of the nearest disposal bin. Please keep the lid on the bin and tie any rubbish sacks up securely to stop any rodent/insect infestation.

GAS SAFETY

If your accommodation has a gas cooker, always double check that it has been turned off properly just as you would at home. Please follow any Gas Safety instructions provided. In many cases you will find that the gas is supplied direct from a bottle - as an extra precaution, turn the supply off at the bottleneck when it is not in use.

Never attempt to locate a gas leak yourself or tamper with the gas supply. If you are unsure about how any of the gas appliances operate or have any queries or concerns please ask your Representative for assistance and advice.

SMOKING MATERIALS

Please take care when discarding matches, cigarettes etc. Always use the ashtrays provided. Never throw a cigarette end carelessly within the grounds or outside, especially near trees and plants. In summer the vegetation can be tinder-dry and fires can start all too easily. Please note that it is absolutely prohibited to use any type of flammable materials inside the villa.

KEYS

Please be careful when you are outside the villa not to lock yourselves out. This can happen easily as the wind can slam doors very quickly! Should you get locked out keys are held by the maids and your Representative. Please note that these extra keys are for use only in emergency - we cannot provide spare keys as a matter of course.

SUNBATHING

A healthier colour makes us all feel better, but taking too much sun can be both painful and dangerous. Build up your tan gradually by minimising your exposure during the first few days of your holiday. Remember the sun's rays are at their strongest between the hours of 11.00 to 15.00.

- Always use a sunscreen that protects against UVA and UVB (ultra violet) and has a high SPF (sun protection factor)
- Avoid midday sun, but if you have to go out, cover up with loose clothing and wear a wide brimmed hat
- Never expose babies under six months to direct sunlight
- Remember you can still burn in the shade, when it's cloudy or when you're swimming.

Wind and water intensify the sun's effect, so while you may feel cool, you could be burning. Always re-apply sunscreen after swimming

- Where possible, seek natural shade

SWIMMING POOL SAFETY

You will find that many swimming pools are not designed in the same way as the UK and may have unusual features. Take care when walking around the pool, as pool surrounds are often slippery when wet. Do not use the pool if you cannot see the bottom and do not tamper with the pool filter covers, report any defects to your Representative immediately. In general, pools do not have a lifeguard so we strongly recommend that you read through this Swimming Pool Safety section.

NEVER put any liquids or chemicals into the pool yourself. The pool pump house housing the pump and filtration equipment should normally be locked and not accessible. However, if for some reason the pump house is open, perhaps for access to the “Pool Lights” switch, **NEVER** touch any of the equipment. Keep children out of the pump house at all times. If pool chemicals such as chlorine and acid are in the pump house, under no circumstances touch them and ask your Representative to have them removed to a safe place. Concentrated chlorine and acid will cause severe burns on contact with skin.

Please take a few minutes to read this information and familiarise yourself with the points mentioned below.

- Please note that the pool is unattended and therefore you are responsible for the safety of any children and non-swimmers in your party to act responsibly around the pool area.
- Diving is NOT permitted.
- If you are at a shared pool please consider others and be respectful of other swimmers.
- Please familiarise yourself on arrival with the depth of the pool. In particular the deep and shallow ends as well as the steepness of the slopes. Pay close attention to the depth markings.
- Shower before and after using the pool - this will help maintain good hygiene standards, keep the pool clean and functioning properly.
- Please do not swim in the pool after using suntan lotions or oils as this can damage the filter systems.
- It is your responsibility to ensure children in your party are supervised at all times when using the pool and the surrounding areas.
- Please do not run or allow children to run around the pool areas.
- Please remove all toys and swimming aids from the pool and the pool area when the pool is no longer in use and when an adult is not supervising the area.
- Please avoid using drinking glasses, bottles and anything breakable around the pool area.
- No alcohol should be consumed before or during the use of the swimming pool.
- Should the weather turn windy, please ensure any parasols are closed or where possible removed from the pool area. Please ensure they are also closed when not in use.
- Beware of slippery surfaces and raised edges in and around the pool.
- Do not tamper with the pool filter covers, pool lights or any pool equipment.

DRIVING

Driving overseas can be great fun and a good way to explore. However, conditions and procedures can differ to those we are familiar with in the UK. The rules of the road can be very different, drivers are not always obliged to stop at pedestrian crossings and you may need to look the other way when crossing the road! Please be fully aware of the local regulations regarding the "Highway Code". Information on speed limits can be obtained from the car hire company.

GREEN LIVING

We at Ionian Island Holidays take an active role in assuring that we do our utmost to be energy aware and we do all we can to aid conservation to help the environment. We know many of our guests want to conserve energy and water, so here are a few tips to help you during your stay

WATER CONSERVATION

- 🌿 Turn taps off when brushing your teeth or shaving
- 🌿 Take shorter showers: recommended time 4 mins
- 🌿 Fully load the washing machine/ dishwasher OR, if not full, use the half load button if available
- 🌿 Use lower economy settings on washing machines and dishwashers
- 🌿 Do not leave taps running unnecessarily



ENERGY CONSERVATION

- 🌿 Switch off lights when not in use
- 🌿 Kettles use lots of electricity - so only boil what you need and don't overfill
- 🌿 Don't leave TVs/DVD-players/Radios on standby - this still uses a lot of electricity
- 🌿 Don't leave your mobile phone or other device charger plugged into the socket when not charging, as this still draws on electricity
- 🌿 If it's not too hot, instead of using the air-conditioning, open doors and windows and let the cool summer breezes in
- 🌿 To maximise air-conditioning, ensure external doors and windows are shut (air-conditioning in some properties will not work otherwise)
- 🌿 Optimum air-conditioning temperature is 22-24°, helping conserve energy and preventing units from potentially freezing up and causing water leakage (Remember, it's not recommended to sleep with air-conditioning as you may catch a chill)
- 🌿 If the hot water switch is on, make sure it is turned off when not needed

EXPLORING STENI VALA

Patitiri takes its name from the wine presses once located here. The wines of Alonissos were famous throughout the region until the Phylloxera virus decimated the vineyards in the 1950's. At that time, the island's capital and main village was the spectacularly sited Chora or 'Palea Alonissos' (Alonissos Old Town), a cluster of traditional Sporadic houses built around the walls of a Venetian hilltop fortress dating back to the 15th century.

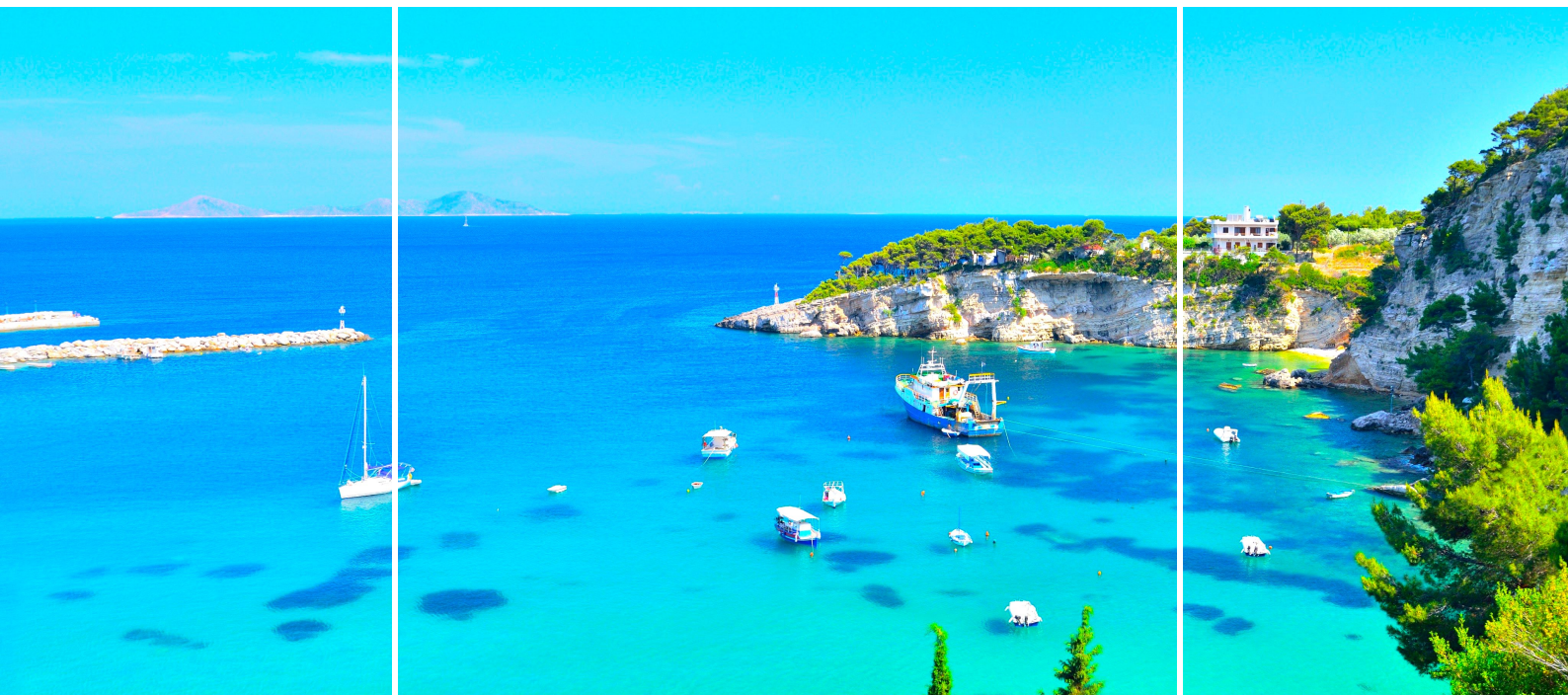

Located 10km north east of Patitiri and surrounded by pine trees, the lovely harbour of Steni Vala is set in a beautiful bay. Even at the height of the summer season the pace of life in seems much more in tune with a less hectic age. Perhaps this is the reason why one of the earliest Paleolithic human settlements in the Aegean (between 10,000 and 300,000 years ago!) has been discovered here. The village has a selection of seaside tavernas, and this is where the Monk Seal Treatment and Rehabilitation Centre is located.



LOCAL AMENITIES

SHOPS

You will find plenty of souvenir and clothing shops as well as jewellery and other boutique stores in Chora. During peak summer season the shops will stay open from early in the morning until late at night.

BANK

Your nearest bank is located in Patitiri, at the island's main port, a 35 minute drive from your property. The bank stays open Monday to Thursday, 8.00am to 2.30pm and Friday 8.00am to 2.00pm.

SUPERMARKET

Your nearest supermarket is located in Steni Vala, at a short walking distance from your property. The supermarket is open 7 days a week.

PHARMACY

There are two pharmacies in Patitiri, both on the island's main road. One you will find at the beginning of the road, on your left hand side, and another, 500m from the port, on the other side of the road. Should you require more information please contact your Representative.

MEDICAL CENTRE

The island's medical centre is located in Patitiri, 500m from the port. Should you require more information please contact your Representative.

DENTIST

Your nearest dentist is located in Patitiri, 1km from the port. Should you require more information please contact your Representative.

BAKERY

Your nearest bakery is located in your local mini market, at a 20 minute walk from your property.

RESTAURANTS

You will find several restaurants in Steni Vala, by the small port, a 20 minute walk from your property. However, a plethora of restaurants, traditional Greek tavernas and bars you will find in Chora.

BEACHES

One of your nearest bays is the beautiful Glyfa beach, near Steni Vala, at a short 5 minute drive from your property.

POST OFFICE

At Alonissos main port you will also find the post office. It is located on the main road, 500m from the port. The opening hours are Monday to Friday, 8.00am to 2.00pm.

PETROL STATION

Your nearest petrol station is located on the main road in Patitiri, 1km from port and near Votsi, called Jet Oil. A second petrol station you will find at the beginning of the road, on your way to Chora, 900m from the port, called EKO.

EXPLORING ALONISSOS

‘I dive from a cliff into the bright blue Aegean and return to you, fresh as a newborn child.’ – *Greek Island* by Mark Rockery

Alonissos is the most peaceful, remote and least developed of the three inhabited islands in the northern Sporades. Alonissos is the haven we all dream of when life and work becomes too stressful, yet it is a mere two hours from Skiathos international airport.

The voyage to Alonissos is a mini-cruise in its own right, passing small islands and spectacular cliffs. It's the perfect way to prepare for your arrival at the island capital and the port of Patitiri, where you will soon discover that arriving on the ferry may well be the busiest event of the day. Life on Alonissos runs at its own pace. Rush hour may well mean half a dozen cars on the road at one time and a wild night out could be sitting on your terrace by the pool, a glass of local wine to hand, star-gazing whilst the kebabs sizzle on the barbecue!

This is not to say that there is little to do on the island. Although only 12kms long and 4kms wide, there are dozens of well-maintained mule paths criss-crossing the island, linking the scattered hamlets and small fishing villages which are a walker's or mountain biker's paradise. Equally, jostling for a patch of sand on a crowded beach is unheard of here, but if the sunbathing palls, then kayaking, snorkelling and diving are all available, as are boat trips around the Sporades National Marine Park, taking in the neighbouring islets of Peristera and Lechoussa and the teeming marine life both in and out of the seas surrounding them.

The island suffered much damage from an earthquake in 1965, and many of the buildings around the island have been newly built since. However a number of the original Sporadian buildings in the hilltop village and ancient capital of the island, Chora, have now been restored. Wonder around the jumble of narrow alleys, traditional tavernas, shops, houses, and the ruined fortress, and admire one of the finest viewpoints in the Sporades.

And the tiny but picturesque fishing village of Steni Vala with its lovely harbour and waterfront tavernas serving fresh fish straight off the boat is well worth a visit.

Fishing is still a widespread activity here, and so too is agriculture, which mainly comprises of winemaking and mixed farming. The island's main products are grapes, figs, almonds, and olives. And

although the islanders now mostly live from tourism, Alonissos remains relatively unspoilt, making it a perfect place for a peaceful getaway.

A BRIEF HISTORY

This now quiet island was one of the first islands of the Aegean to be inhabited. In its position at the crossroads of major sea routes, legend has it that it was from Alonissos that Jason and the Argonauts sailed to Kolhida to retrieve the Golden Fleece, and that it is also from here that the Achaean ships sailed to Troy. There are a number of shipwrecks dating from classical times and the more recent, Byzantine era which lie on the bottom of the sea.



Tradition holds that the Cretans, with the mythical hero, Staphylo as their leader, established colonies on Peparithos and on Ikos (as Alonissos was known to the Ancient Greeks) in the 16th century B.C. during the Minoan domination of the

Aegean Sea. The Mycenaean city stood on the site today known as Kokkinokastro, on the eastern side of the island. However, it is historically ascertained that the Geometric period finds Ikos under the domination of the Dolopes. In time the Dolopes turned into dangerous pirates and became the scourge of the Aegean. The Athenian navy set out to confront them later on, under the leadership of Cimon, who routed them and annexed all the islands to Athens. Thus, in 476 B.C. the island joined the first Athenian Alliance.

During the classical period Ikos must have contained two cities, one of them probably located at Kokkinokastro, where the ruins of the wall remain until today, and the other on the site where the village of Horio, or Old Alonissos, stands today. During that period the island was renowned for its vineyards and its exceptional wine.

In 190 B.C. the island was taken by the Roman navy. After this point there is no further information on the history of Ikos until the occupation of Constantinople by the Franks in 1204 A.D. when both Constantinople and the other neighbouring islands passed into the hands of the Venetians. Together with Skopelos, Alonissos was occupied by successive conquerors. After the fall of Constantinople to the Turks in 1453, the islands were turned back over to the Venetians. They remained Venetian until 1538 when the Turkish navy, under the leadership of Khair-ed-Din Barbarossa, imposed Turkish authority.

During the Greek revolution of 1821 and the first years of the Greek Nation's independence, Greeks from different parts of the country took refuge on Alonissos. These people, along with the natives of the island, compose the present population.

CHORA

Patitiri takes its name from the wine presses once located here. The wines of Alonissos were famous throughout the region until the Phylloxera virus decimated the vineyards in the 1950's. At that time, the island's capital and main village was the spectacularly sited Chora or 'Palea Alonissos' (Alonissos Old Town), a cluster of traditional Sporadic houses built around the walls of a Venetian hilltop fortress dating back to the 15th century. Unfortunately, the village was destroyed by an earthquake in 1965 and most of the inhabitants had to resettle in nearby Patitiri, which is the main port and can now be loosely described as the island's capital. Over the last few years, old Chora has been carefully restored and the village is now popular for its fantastic views, sunsets, traditional tavernas and steep, narrow cobbled streets.

VOTSI

Just a couple of kilometres north west of Patitiri is the tranquil little fishing village of Votsi. Lying around one of the most beautiful bays on the island, this charming little harbour filled with small fishing boats (caiques), is lined with romantic tavernas.

THE ALONISSOS MUSEUM

Set on a hill above Patitiri, this is the largest privately owned museum on any island in Greece. Founded in 2000, its

collection showcases the historical and cultural heritage of Alonissos. Exhibits include objects of everyday life, articles of clothing, weapons and other artefacts used by pirates of the Aegean sea. Space is also given to works of art by local artists both past and present. There is a small fee for admission.

NATIONAL MARINE PARK OF ALONISSOS

The National Marine Park of Alonissos is located in the northern Sporades and is currently the largest marine protected area in Europe (approximately 2.260 km²) and the first of its kind in Greece. The park also includes the island of Alonissos, six smaller islands, as well as 22 uninhabited islets and rocky outcrops. Proposed by the German zoologist, Thomas Schultze-Westrum, who had extensively explored the area and found it to be of great ecological and biological value, and agreed to by the local fisherman, the first order to protect the area was issued in 1986. This was soon followed by the formation of the Mom NGO by young marine biologists to observe and protect the Mediterranean Monk Seal. Alonissos is also home to the Medical Care of Seals centre, which ensures their safe return to their natural habitat. The team is always on hand to give first-aid to seals should the need arise.



TOP BEACHES

CHRISI MILIA

The only really golden sandy beach on the island benefits from shallow, crystal clear waters which make it ideal for children - and scuba divers! There are tavernas by the beach and sunbeds and parasols for rent.

GIALIA & VRISITSA BEACHES

If you take the road from Patitiri to the Old Village, there are tracks to pebble beaches on the right hand side of the road: Gialia (turn right just past the turning signposted OTE) and Vrisitsa (turn right immediately after the corn circles).

AGIOS DIMITRIOS

Probably the most beautiful on the island (and has been included in the list for the "10 best beaches of the planet"), this very long, white pebble beach with turquoise waters has spectacular views. There is a canteen and a taverna on the beach, and sunbeds and parasols for rent down one end.

KOKKINOKASTRO

At the foot of a steep cliff of imposing red rocks, this white stone and pebble beach has calm, clear turquoise waters. A short way out to sea lie the ruins of the sunken neolithic city of Eikos, making it a perfect place for snorkelling or scuba diving. Sunbeds and parasols are available but there are no food and drink facilities.



MARPOUNTA

Moving south from Patitiri, there are swimming areas to the left of the road to Marpounta. These are small inlets between the rocks which offer a certain degree of privacy, if not too much comfort - take a lilo! About 500m before Marpounta (which is an Italian Resort Hotel and closed to non-residents) there is a turning on the right which is a graded road leading to Megalos Mourtias.



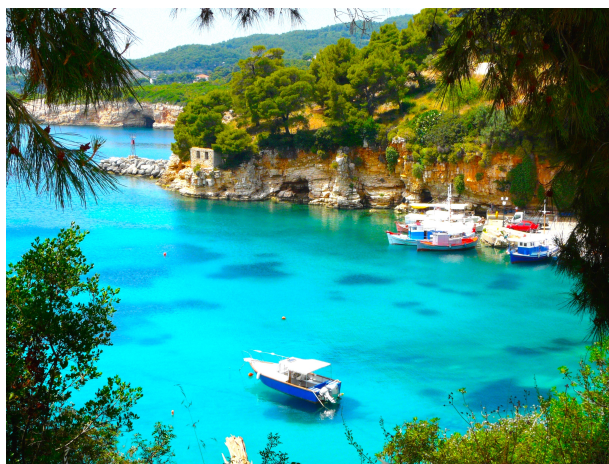

LEFTOS GIALOS BEACH

Surrounded by pine trees, this large, popular, sandy pebble beach with crystal-clear waters has two tavernas and a beach bar (which are all open at night), together with sunbeds and parasols for hire.

VOTSI & SPARTINES BAYS

A 20 minutes walk from Patitiri, Votsi is a small beach looking out over the harbour which is home to many fishing and pleasure crafts. There are tavernas on each side of the bay. Just beyond Votsi, and accessible only on foot, is the small beach of Spartines.

ROUSSOUM

This little bay right next to Patitiri has a popular white shingle beach with several traditional tavernas serving fresh fish and seafood, and a cantina. The tiny, pretty, harbour was the original port from where wine was sold/exported. Its name originates from the Turkish word 'Rsum', meaning 'taxes'.



LOCAL FOOD

The island of Alonissos promises to offer a rich gastronomic experience with dishes made of fresh ingredients and home made pastries. Throughout the island you will find a plethora of luxurious Greek restaurants, traditional tavernas and plenty of diverse eateries offering quality international cuisine.

FETA CHEESE

Made of sheep's and goat's milk and produced in blocks, feta is the most popular Greek cheese used in lots of Greek dishes, salads and even pastries. High quality feta should have the aroma of ewe's milk, yoghurt and butter, together with a smooth and thick texture.
