ABOUT POUNDA PAOU

CLEANING

The property is cleaned on Tuesday and Friday. The cleaner will dispose of your rubbish.

HOT WATER

The water is heated by both solar power and a boiler system. Hot water should be available at all times. If otherwise, please contact your Representative.

AIR CONDITIONING

The air conditioning is operated by a remote control. The usual temperature is around 22°C. All doors and windows should be closed for air conditioning to function properly.

KEYS

The keys to your property can be found in the front door and instructions on where to leave them will be given in your departure letter. We would ask that you take good care of the keys to the property as if they are your own. In the unlikely event you were to lose the keys, please contact your Representative and you will be provided with a spare set.

However, should it be necessary to change the locks for security reasons as a result of lost keys, we reserve the right to make a charge for which you may be liable for. We would ask that you also be mindful when you are outside the villa



and around the pool area not to lock yourselves out. This can happen easily as the wind can slam doors very quickly.

Should you get locked out contact your Representative.

Please note that these extra keys are for use only in emergency - we cannot provide spare keys as a matter of course.

WATER

The property's tap water is not drinkable. We advise you to consume bottled water.

INTERNET

Wifi connection is free of charge. Details of passwords are given in your welcome letter.

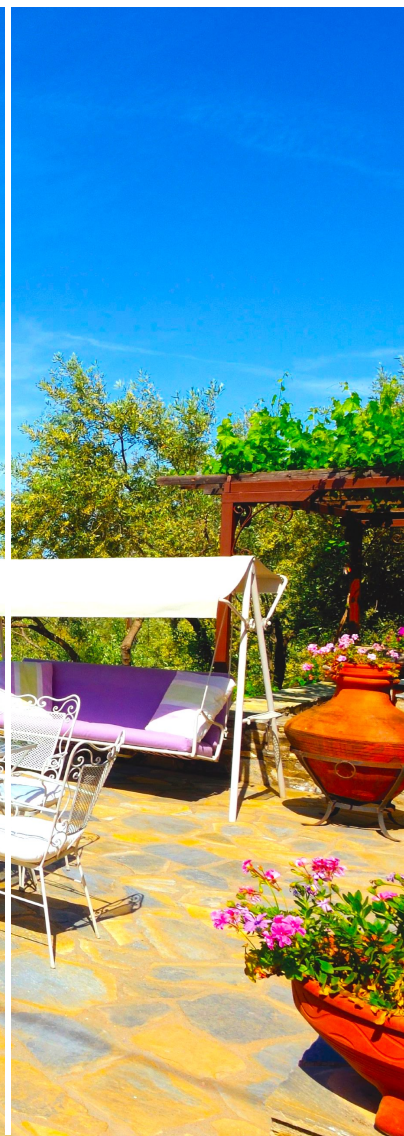
SWIMMING POOL

The pool is cleaned twice a week.

LOST PROPERTY

Please ensure all personal possessions are packed when leaving your accommodation. Whilst we will endeavour to assist when items are left, unfortunately we are unable to guarantee the return of any items which

have been left unattended and will not be liable for any items lost or damaged. If we are able to locate your lost item, postage, packaging and handling fees may apply for the return of the lost items.



HEALTH & SAFETY

To help ensure that your holiday will be both happy and safe, we would kindly ask that you take the time to read the following information.

Part of the enjoyment of traveling abroad is experiencing a different way of life. Please remember though, that it may also mean experiencing different standards from those we are used to at home. We are continually working to raise safety standards in all of our properties and will of course do our best to ensure that your holiday is safe and trouble-free, but we do ask that you take extra care while you are away. With this in mind, we would like to highlight the following important points.

FIRE SAFETY

Other countries have different fire safety regulations and procedures. Please read carefully all safety information available in your property and in this information book. When you first arrive, please make sure you familiarise yourself with the location of the fire exits and the location of all fire extinguishers.

To help avoid the risk of fire, please take particular care when cooking and using the barbecue.

IN THE UNLIKELY EVENT OF A FIRE:

- RAISE THE ALARM
- CALL THE FIRE BRIGADE - 199
- DO NOT PANIC

Leave the building. Do not stop to take personal belongings with you

- IF THE EXITS/STAIRS ARE BLOCKED keep the doors shut and try to get out onto a balcony for fresh air and to attract attention
- DO NOT RE-ENTER THE BUILDING - AWAIT FOR CLEARANCE FROM THE FIRE BRIGADE

BATHROOMS

In common with many Mediterranean countries, your bathroom will probably have a marble or tiled floor. Shower curtains are not always provided and most bathrooms do not have non-slip mats in either the bath or shower, so extra care must be taken when the floor is wet, particularly with children.

Due to the size of the standard bore sewerage pipe used, Greek toilets cannot properly dispose of any paper or other waste material. To avoid blockages, please ensure that all paper, nappies and sanitary items are placed in the bin provided, which will be emptied regularly.

GLASS PANELS/DOORS

Although most properties have safety stickers on glass doors this may not always be the case, so particular care should be taken when walking through glass patio doors, as it can be difficult to tell if they are open or closed.

SECURITY AND VALUABLES

Where available, it is generally advisable to use the safety deposit facilities, or hotel safe, at your property, particularly for valuables.

WATER

Although tap water is purified it can cause upset stomachs and so it is best to drink bottled water, which may be purchased in local shops. To avoid dehydration and the effects of the sun it is advisable to drink water, in addition to other drinks you may consume.

PLUMBING

Drainage systems in Greece are not always efficient as small bore pipes are often used. A blockage will cause considerable inconvenience and during the summer season plumbers can be hard to find. To avoid problems of this nature, please do not put any products other than a small amount of toilet paper into the toilet. A bin is provided in the bathroom for disposable nappies and other sanitary products.

RUBBISH DISPOSAL

The maid will dispose of your rubbish on visits to the property. If you wish to dispose of rubbish in between visits, your Representative will advise you of the nearest disposal bin. Please keep the lid on the bin and tie any rubbish sacks up securely to stop any rodent/insect infestation.

GAS SAFETY

If your accommodation has a gas cooker, always double check that it has been turned off properly just as you would at home. Please follow any Gas Safety instructions provided. In many cases you will find that the gas is supplied direct from a bottle - as an extra precaution, turn the supply off at the bottleneck when it is not in use.

Never attempt to locate a gas leak yourself or tamper with the gas supply. If you are unsure about how any of the gas appliances operate or have any queries or concerns please ask your Representative for assistance and advice.

SMOKING MATERIALS

Please take care when discarding matches, cigarettes etc. Always use the ashtrays provided. Never throw a cigarette end carelessly within the grounds or outside, especially near trees and plants. In summer the vegetation can be tinder-dry and fires can start all too easily. Please note that it is absolutely prohibited to use any type of flammable materials inside the villa.

KEYS

Please be careful when you are outside the villa not to lock yourselves out. This can happen easily as the wind can slam doors very quickly! Should you get locked out keys are held by the maids and your Representative. Please note that these extra keys are for use only in emergency - we cannot provide spare keys as a matter of course.

SUNBATHING

A healthier colour makes us all feel better, but taking too much sun can be both painful and dangerous. Build up your tan gradually by minimising your exposure during the first few days of your holiday. Remember the sun's rays are at their strongest between the hours of 11.00 to 15.00.

- Always use a sunscreen that protects against UVA and UVB (ultra violet) and has a high SPF (sun protection factor)
- Avoid midday sun, but if you have to go out, cover up with loose clothing and wear a wide brimmed hat
- Never expose babies under six months to direct sunlight
- Remember you can still burn in the shade, when it's cloudy or when you're swimming.

Wind and water intensify the sun's effect, so while you may feel cool, you could be burning. Always re-apply sunscreen after swimming

- Where possible, seek natural shade

SWIMMING POOL SAFETY

You will find that many swimming pools are not designed in the same way as the UK and may have unusual features. Take care when walking around the pool, as pool surrounds are often slippery when wet. Do not use the pool if you cannot see the bottom and do not tamper with the pool filter covers, report any defects to your Representative immediately. In general, pools do not have a lifeguard so we strongly recommend that you read through this Swimming Pool Safety section.

NEVER put any liquids or chemicals into the pool yourself. The pool pump house housing the pump and filtration equipment should normally be locked and not accessible. However, if for some reason the pump house is open, perhaps for access to the “Pool Lights” switch, **NEVER** touch any of the equipment. Keep children out of the pump house at all times. If pool chemicals such as chlorine and acid are in the pump house, under no circumstances touch them and ask your Representative to have them removed to a safe place. Concentrated chlorine and acid will cause severe burns on contact with skin.

Please take a few minutes to read this information and familiarise yourself with the points mentioned below.

- Please note that the pool is unattended and therefore you are responsible for the safety of any children and non-swimmers in your party to act responsibly around the pool area.
- Diving is NOT permitted.
- If you are at a shared pool please consider others and be respectful of other swimmers.
- Please familiarise yourself on arrival with the depth of the pool. In particular the deep and shallow ends as well as the steepness of the slopes. Pay close attention to the depth markings.
- Shower before and after using the pool - this will help maintain good hygiene standards, keep the pool clean and functioning properly.
- Please do not swim in the pool after using suntan lotions or oils as this can damage the filter systems.
- It is your responsibility to ensure children in your party are supervised at all times when using the pool and the surrounding areas.
- Please do not run or allow children to run around the pool areas.
- Please remove all toys and swimming aids from the pool and the pool area when the pool is no longer in use and when an adult is not supervising the area.
- Please avoid using drinking glasses, bottles and anything breakable around the pool area.
- No alcohol should be consumed before or during the use of the swimming pool.
- Should the weather turn windy, please ensure any parasols are closed or where possible removed from the pool area. Please ensure they are also closed when not in use.
- Beware of slippery surfaces and raised edges in and around the pool.
- Do not tamper with the pool filter covers, pool lights or any pool equipment.

DRIVING

Driving overseas can be great fun and a good way to explore. However, conditions and procedures can differ to those we are familiar with in the UK. The rules of the road can be very different, drivers are not always obliged to stop at pedestrian crossings and you may need to look the other way when crossing the road! Please be fully aware of the local regulations regarding the “Highway Code”. Information on speed limits can be obtained from the car hire company.

GREEN LIVING

We at Ionian Island Holidays take an active role in assuring that we do our utmost to be energy aware and we do all we can to aid conservation to help the environment. We know many of our guests want to conserve energy and water, so here are a few tips to help you during your stay

WATER CONSERVATION

- 🌿 Turn taps off when brushing your teeth or shaving
- 🌿 Take shorter showers: recommended time 4 mins
- 🌿 Fully load the washing machine/ dishwasher OR, if not full, use the half load button if available
- 🌿 Use lower economy settings on washing machines and dishwashers
- 🌿 Do not leave taps running unnecessarily



ENERGY CONSERVATION

- 🌿 Switch off lights when not in use
- 🌿 Kettles use lots of electricity - so only boil what you need and don't overfill
- 🌿 Don't leave TVs/DVD-players/Radios on standby - this still uses a lot of electricity
- 🌿 Don't leave your mobile phone or other device charger plugged into the socket when not charging, as this still draws on electricity
- 🌿 If it's not too hot, instead of using the air-conditioning, open doors and windows and let the cool summer breezes in
- 🌿 To maximise air-conditioning, ensure external doors and windows are shut (air-conditioning in some properties will not work otherwise)
- 🌿 Optimum air-conditioning temperature is 22-24°, helping conserve energy and preventing units from potentially freezing up and causing water leakage (Remember, it's not recommended to sleep with air-conditioning as you may catch a chill)
- 🌿 If the hot water switch is on, make sure it is turned off when not needed

EXPLORING PAOU

Pounda Paou, set amongst olive trees overlooking the Pagasitic Gulf is over an hours drive from of the city of Volos. Sitting beside its lovely swimming pool or down on the private jetty watching the fishermen casting their nets into the blue waters of the Pagasitic Gulf, it might just as well be half a world away.

The motor boats can be used until 4/5pm each day giving you the freedom to see a completely different aspect of the coastline. For an alternative choice of tavernas one can venture to the waterside village of Horto around the headland from Pounda Paou, which is twenty minutes by car quicker by boat, Milina with a wider choice or Argalasti a ten minute drive from Paou.



LOCAL AMENITIES

SHOPS

Your nearest shops can be found in Argalasti. During peak summer season the shops will stay open from early in the morning until late at night.

BANK

Your nearest bank is located in Aghia village, at a 50 minute drive from Paou. The branch is open Monday to Friday, 8.00am to 2.00pm.

MINI MARKET

Your nearest mini market is located in Argalasti, 6km from Paou. You will find it open throughout the day, all week long.

PHARMACY

Your nearest pharmacy is located in Argalasti village, at a 15 minute drive from Paou. It remains closed from 2.00pm to 5.30pm daily. Should you require more information please contact your Representative.

DOCTOR

Your nearest doctor, a GP, is located in Kala Nera village, at a 40 minute drive from Paou. In Argalasti village you will also find a Medical Centre. Should you require more information please contact your Representative.

DENTIST

The only dentist around Pelion can be found in Volos, 40km from Paou. Should you require more information please contact your Representative.

BAKERY

Similar to the mini market, the bakery is located in Argalasti, 6km from Paou. You will find it open throughout the day, all week long.

RESTAURANTS

Your nearest restaurants are located in Argalasti - you will find plenty of Greek tavernas.

BEACHES

Your nearest bay is Paou beach, 1km from your accommodation.

POST OFFICE

The post office is located in Volos. The opening hours are Monday to Friday, 8.00am to 2.00pm.

PETROL STATION

Your nearest petrol stations can be found in Argalasti village. Another station you will find in the village of Lafkos. Usually petrol stations will stay open until 10.00pm.

EXPLORING PELION

The Greek Gods knew that the Pelion was special home and birthplace of the half man half horse centaurs, though of fearsome reputation they had a deep knowledge of plants and herbal healing it was a centaur, Cherion, who was entrusted with educating heroes and demigods, almighty warriors such as Hercules, Achilles and Jason.

Legendary home of the centaurs, the mountains of the Pelion Peninsula are quite simply unique. Covered in forests of chestnut and beech, riven by deep gorges, and with very few settlements they might seem accessible only to intrepid explorers.

Appearances can be deceptive. Although few roads cross the central mountains, the high villages with their distinctive tall stone merchants' houses are all connected to each other and down to the coast by a network of ancient trails known as 'kalderimia'. One such village, Milies, is still connected to the coast by a narrow gauge railway designed by an Italian civil engineer, Evaristo de Chirico. The line crosses the

many gorges via a series of graceful viaducts that formed a central feature of his son, Georgio's, famous dream-like paintings. But there is far more to this fascinating area than wild forest and mountain.

The claw-like Pelion Peninsula forms one arm of the almost landlocked Pagasitic Gulf. This gentler landscape with its scattered fishing villages, olive groves, vineyards and excellent beaches is more typically Greek than the mountains behind.

The Aegean coast of the peninsula is more spectacular. Here, steep stream-filled valleys and ravines end in tree-lined coves and rocky headlands, often with small villages such as Mylopotamos, perched on the steep hillsides. Every cove, inhabited or not, has its stretch of sand or shingle and most are connected by kalderimia that follow the coast.

Volos, one of the major cities and ferry ports of Greece, is the gateway into The Pelion from the vast plains of Thessaly. In recent years the city has been transformed, with new shopping precincts, an excellent museum and one of the largest open air markets in the region.

These days the chances of meeting a centaur on a mountain path might be somewhat remote, more likely a donkey, but the Pelion with its varied landscapes, fascinating history, unique architecture



and beautiful coastline, is a wonderful and unspoilt holiday destination. Here it is easy to see the connection between myth and historical fact. It only takes five minutes on one of the many ancient paths that still link the isolated communities of these majestic mountain forests, to recognise many of the herbs and plants, used medicinally by the ancients, as well as the centaurs, growing in profusion amongst the trees.

The Pelion Peninsula is unique, still largely unknown to foreign visitors, but long recognised by the Greeks as a national treasure to be appreciated and preserved. One can recognise the Pelion on the map as the long peninsula with a claw like promontory at its southern end that divides the Aegean Sea from the Pagasitic Gulf. Cut off in the north by the Pelion Massif, the only easy access by land is a narrow corridor from the great plain of Thessaly to the west at the head of the gulf through the city of Volos. The mountains, snow covered in winter (there

streams. The region is one of the most fertile and verdant in the eastern Mediterranean.

The Pelion is famous for its fruit, particularly apples. In the springtime when the blossom appears and the native chestnut, oak and beech trees are bursting into leaf, the colours and textures are simply breathtaking. In the full heat of summer the tree cover means that the temperature is at least five degrees less than out in the open. One of the great pleasures of a holiday here is to be able to enjoy lying in the sun on a beach with the clear Aegean waters lapping at your feet, before moving to relax in the cool shade of an ancient chestnut tree. September is apple picking time, the orchards are laden with fruit of every colour, whilst the cooler nights turn the forests above into a sea of russet and gold.

The inhabitants of the Pelion, despite a long tradition of independence from the 'mainland', are extremely hospitable and friendly. It is the only region in Greece that remained autonomous throughout the centuries of foreign intervention. Even the usually fearless Ottomans left these mountain villages well alone. Standing on the beach at Mylopotamos, the mouth of a narrow and precipitous ravine, one can easily understand how even the fiercest Turkish general would think twice about committing his warriors to an assault up the twisting steep and narrow trails!

By the 19th century, they had not only survived but many had become prosperous through selling their produce to the increasing population of Volos, a fast-growing port and industrial centre at the head of the Pagasitic Gulf. Wealthy merchants built distinctive large mansions in villages such as Vizitsa and Makrinitza, each trying to out-do their neighbour with colourful embellishments on the upper walls and ornate stained



is even a ski resort on the flanks of Mount Pelion), feed the many rivers and

glass windows, enjoying an exclusive eagle's eye view over the Gulf and the Thessaly Plain.

By the early years of the 20th century, roads were built up into the hills and a railway line was constructed linking Volos with the important village of Milies. Designed by an Italian engineer, Evaristo de Chirico, the narrow gauge line with its graceful viaducts and arches later figured in the work of his son, Giorgio de Chirico, the famous surrealist painter who was born in Volos. The line remains in use to this day as far as Ano Lehonia on the coast and is a deservedly popular tourist attraction.

Small family-run hotels can be found along both coastlines, taking advantage of the many coves and quiet bays, each with beaches of white pebbles or sand. There are a wide variety of tavernas and restaurants which have opened, many offering such delicacies as wild boar and desserts based on the local fruit.

Perhaps the best way to explore this fascinating region is on foot, using the 'kalderimia' mule track network. Although by car the recently improved roads leading into the mountains are no longer a driver's challenge. As one local put it, when asked about the road up to the apple centre of Zagora, "Ah, it's ok,

but it's like a politician, many twists and turns!".

The Aegean coast though rugged, has a number of delightful small villages. Some are no more than a cluster of silver roofed stone cottages above a small cove which make a perfect base for exploring gentler paths that often follow the shoreline past pristine beaches.

The Pagasitic Gulf coast is more sheltered and typically Mediterranean, with olive groves and pine trees overlooking the sand and pebble beaches. Exploring this coast by small boat is a delight or one can take a caique cruise down to the 'claw' of Pelion at Trikeri, with its small island and monastery.



TOP BEACHES

POTISTIKA BEACH

Surrounded by rocks, Potistika is a large, sandy, tranquil, though fashionable beach.

Surrounded by a rocky landscape with lush vegetation, Fakistra beach is close to the village of Tsagarada.



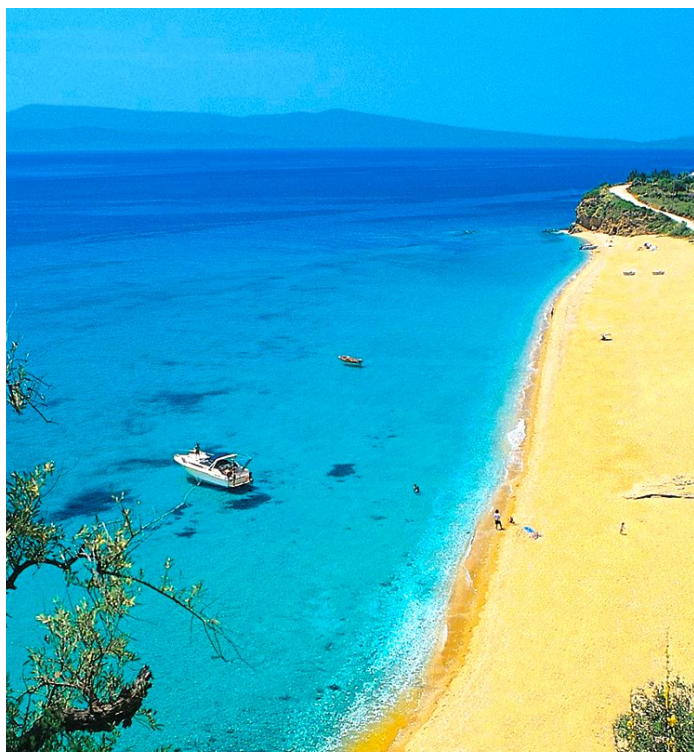

MYLOPOTAMOS BEACH

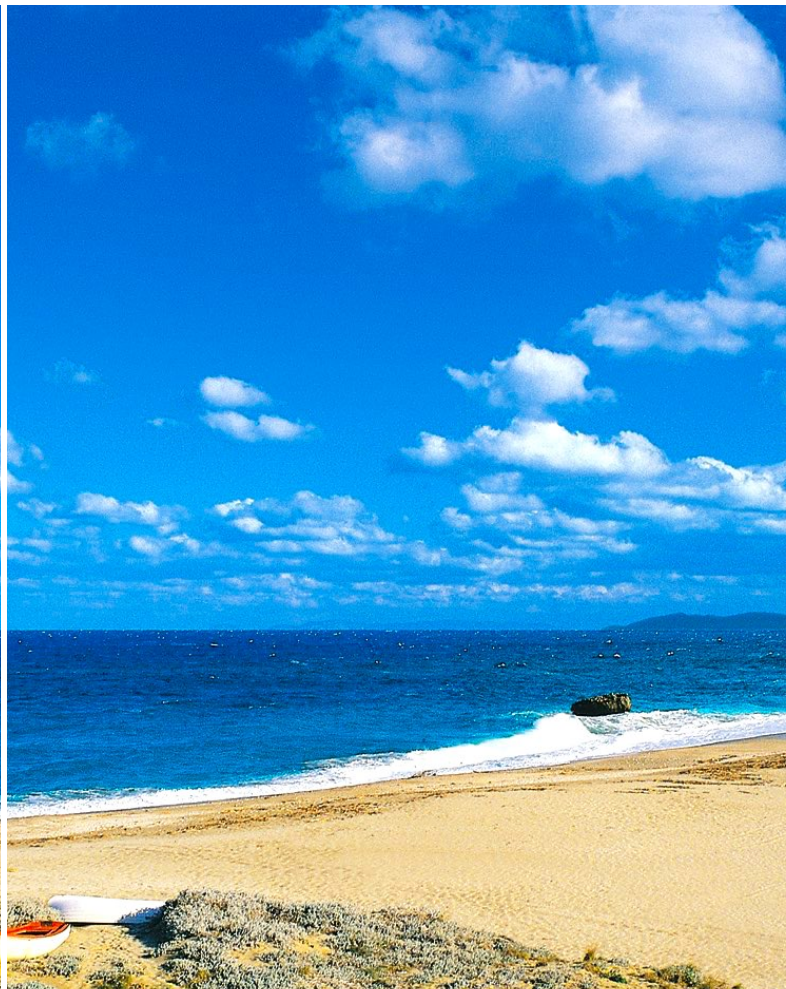
The dramatic twin coves of Mylopotamos Beach, with their golden sand and crystal blue waters, make it one of the most famous beaches on the peninsula.

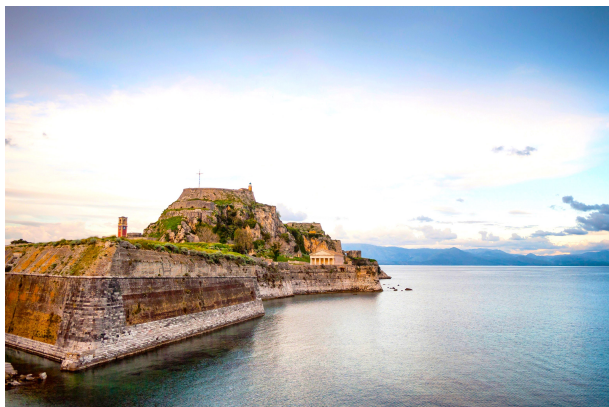
KEFALONIA

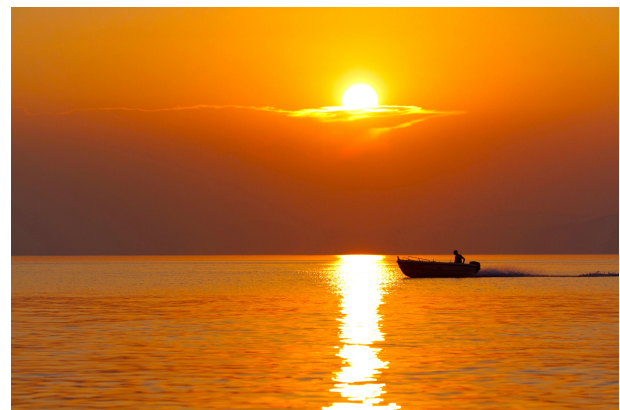
ITHAKA
